Ever since 'The Link' became the Circuit's main quarterly communication I have enjoyed putting together the profile section, relating some of the history and heritage of our town and village churches, along with the part they have, and are continuing to play in the growth of the communities they serve.

Alas, it now seems that I have, somewhat prematurely, reached the point where I am having to call a halt to this feature.

In the last edition of the magazine I did ask those churches that had not yet been featured to send me any information they could for this feature, but none were forthcoming.

Upon further investigation it appears that, sadly, the history of most of those churches is lost forever. As time has gone by old documents, particularly minute books, have disappeared, often due to the death of a church secretary, and the failure of those responsible for disposing of their estate to recognise the significance of the documents, meaning that they are consigned to the dustbin.

This makes me very sad, particularly when we realise that subsequent generations will have no reference to the history of their church.

At least through these articles in the Link over the past issues, we have ensured that their is some kind of record, however incomplete, of the story of Methodism in this part of the world to add to the material available elsewhere.

Hopefully this article will sound alarm bells for us, and we will make sure that anything pertaining to the history of our existing churches, particularly things like minute books, are retained safely for the future. The County Archive Office is always pleased to receive anything for safe keeping, as well as making material available, so may I urge you to please make sure that our history is retained to be shared with those who will be here long after we have gone.

May I just add that should any church discover any kind of cache of information in the future, I will be glad to receive it for use in a future issue.

Mr CHARLES

(22nd November 1920 –

This is a transcript of the appreciation given by Rev Andrew King at Charlie's Funeral.

It is a tremendous privilege today to give a personal tribute as we thank God for the life of Mr Charles James Greves, known to us as Charlie. The first time I met Charlie and also Edna was when I was invited to take a Hindringham Guild meeting early in my ministry in Dereham about 2003 / 2004. Charlie gave me a very warm and firm handshake welcoming me not just to the Guild but to the chapel at Hindringham. As the meeting began with worship I was aware of his powerful and tuneful singing voice, which Charlie maintained until the very end of his life. For him the worship of God was paramount, and with



Edna, they supported the chapel faithfully morning and evening all their married life together until frailty last summer made that impossible.

At that time Charlie may have still be a Circuit steward in the Fakenham Wells & Holt Circuit. As the Circuit Superintendent Minister, I am acutely aware of the time commitment and emotional and spiritual demands which the office lays upon its stewards. Care of the ministers and their families' wellbeing were paramount concerns for Charlie. His style of leadership was to support and encourage all the churches in the Circuit, taking great interest in people and attending Church & Circuit events as often as he could. He saw his ministry as building up the Circuit to become truly the one family of God.

His strong Christian faith and view of the Church was mirrored in his family life, as the Patriarch of the family. A loving husband to Edna and a good and supportive father to Malcolm and Shirley, and father-in-law to Jayne and Barrie; a beloved Grandad to Ben & Emily, Jason & Clarissa, Sophie and Iain, Lucy and Matt, and Hannah and Dan; and a treasured great-grandad to Jack and Elsie, Daisy and Charlie, Molly & Kitty, and Bea and Ned. Family life was central to Charlie and Edna, and the love and affection by which they were held was shown in so many ways.

Another treasured memory of mine will be the gorgeous teas and suppers prepared at or by the chapel, especially Harvest Supper and the May lunches, when all the family would pull out every stop not just to produce the best food possible but also in the décor and ambience turning the chapel or Village Hall into a stylish eating establishment. From Dad the family shared his values that only the best will do and God expects us to offer our best. When I moved to Fakenham I got to know Charlie better and it was a privilege to lead the evening service on Sunday 21st November 2010 to celebrate Charlie's 90th birthday. After a fantastic tea, the chapel was packed for an act of worship café style as we sat around tables. The Circuit that day gave their thanks to Charlie for a life of service dedication and commitment. The Hindringham Guild Male Voice Choir members sang to honour Charlie who was their star singer; and I remember Malcolm giving Dad a wonderful personal tribute. That night I became aware of the perils and dangers Charlie faced as a D-Day veteran and hero; something he modestly had not shared with me before. Again, a tribute to his Christian character as a modest man who never shied away when called to service whatever the danger or sacrifice. I know more will be said at the thanksgiving service, but having shared with Rev James in a number of Remembrance Sunday services at St Martin's Church I was always deeply moved when Charlie, supported by all his family, would come up to the War Memorial each year to lay the wreath of poppies.

Other family landmarks remembered would be Edna & Charlie's 70th wedding anniversary and Edna's 90th in the May of 2016. For Charlie Church, Family and Home, 12 The Elms, Hindringham were central to his life and faith. Today we find comfort in the Psalms especially this verse from Psalm 103 "As a father has compassion for his children, so the Lord has compassion for those who fear him" and we see the fulfilment of this in these later verses, "but the steadfast love of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting on those who fear him, and his righteousness to children's children to those who keep his covenant and remember to do his commandments."

Malcolm, Shirley and all the family would like to thank everyone for all their prayers messages and support after passing of Charlie on the 6th December and also to everyone who attended the Thanksgiving Service on the 6th January, it gave us as a family the opportunity to share how important he was to us as a Dad, Grandad and family member and also what the Chapel had meant to him all his life. It had been a difficult year for Mum and Dad and for the family when we had to make the decision that they needed to go into care but were fortunate that they were able to be together at Eckling Grange in Dereham where he was cared for so well and where Mum is being looked after.



"MY LIFE AROUND AGRICULTURE"

A talk by Baroness Gillian Shephard

The changes and challenges facing modern agriculture affect the lives of everyone living in the countryside and inevitably touch the work and witness of our village churches and chapels. It was this which prompted Fulmodeston's Methodists to seek the support of others concerned with village life in their area to initiate a series of biennial meetings to explore some of these issues. The Barney, Fulmodeston and Thursford Food Production Club was pleased to support the project as were the Thursford Methodists, the Anglican Churches in the three villages and the Parish Councils of both Thursford and Fulmodeston-with-Barney. We have always endeavoured to make the meetings relevant and interesting to both those directly involved in agriculture and those new to country living who want to learn more about the industry which forms the background to their lives.

Speakers from the John Innes Institute, Easton Agricultural College and Pensthope Nature Reserve have been amongst those who have addressed such topics as Conventional, Organic and Conservation Grade farming, Genetic Engineering, Environmental issues and Agricultural Education. At our last meeting, in 2016, the public were invited to put questions to a well-informed panel of four local farmers.

For our fifth meeting on 1st March this year our guest will be Norfolk born Rt. Hon. Baroness Gillian Shephard, a former Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food who will speak to the title "My Life around Agriculture".

As usual the meeting will be hosted by the Food Production Club in Fulmodeston's Old School Hall and, to make it an enjoyable social as well as informative event, a cold buffet will be available (and the bar open) from 6.30 before the formal proceedings begin at 7.30 p.m.

Baroness Shepard is an excellent speaker - and an entry fee of £3.00 will give you access to what promises to be a very informative and enjoyable evening.

TELL + TEACH + TEND + TRANSFORM + TREASURE

- 1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom. Proclamation may be in words but also in actions, by living the Good News we preach. In many ways this is foundational a summary of what all mission is about.
- 2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers Christian discipleship is about lifelong learning, so we all need formal and informal resources for growing in faith, so that the Church is a learning environment for all ages.
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service. Churches have a long tradition of care through pastoral ministry. Christians are called to respond to the needs of people locally and in the wider human community.
- 4. To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and to pursue peace and reconciliation. Jesus and the OT prophets before him challenged oppressive structures in God's name. Christians should not only press for change, but also demonstrate justice within Church structures.
- 5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the sea, the life of the earth. The Bible's vision of salvation is universal in its scope. We are called to promote the wellbeing of the human community and its environment, so that Creation may live in harmony.

This series is inspired by a course organised by the Anglican Church of Bermuda, and devised by the Bishop of that Diocese. We will be running it as an ecumenical venture, with session leaders from both Methodist and Anglican traditions. Sessions begin at 10am with coffee, and last for an hour. This is an extension of our very popular 'Second Friday' study group which meets throughout the rest of the year. Folk are invited to join in at whatever level they find comfortable, whether by speaking or simply listening. We are a very lively bunch, and along with the serious side of study there are inevitably moments of complete hilarity. If you fancy joining us everyone will be made very welcome. 

THE NIXON MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

From Rosemary Wakelin: The Nixon Memorial Hospital began almost accidently early in the last century when a missionary and his wife, who had braved the climate and the mosquitoes, were besieged by sick people looking for medical help. They did what they could on the verandah of their bungalow. This was in Segbwema, 200 miles up-country from Freetown, capital of Sierra Leone.

The need was so great that the Methodist Missionary Society (as it then was) funded and then staffed a basic hospital with qualified medical staff and a nursing school was started.

In the early 50s Alderman Nixon, one time Mayor of Newcastle on Tyne, and a devoted Methodist, made a very generous donation to fund the building of a modern Operating Theatre. The Sierra Leone Army donated a generator (no longer needed for search lights) and the hospital entered the 20th century, with electricity for basic x-ray equipment and house lights in the evening – (when they worked!) and became the Nixon Memorial Hospital.

It was in the 50s that my husband Paul, (recently recovered from TB contracted at the Maua Methodist Hospital in Kenya) was appointed as one of the three doctors. So we arrived in Segbwema — with 6 month old twins — Mark and Mary. The work was relentless for the medical staff. Paul would begin at 7am and apart from meal breaks would often not finish before 9 or10pm, and then would be on call through the night — and there were many night calls particularly from the Maternity Ward. I taught English in the Nursing School as all the medical exams were in English. I also taught maths in the Methodist High School.

Because of our well qualified staff the Nursing School flourished and candidates came from all over the country., and although a remote up-country Hospital, the standard of treatment and success rates were such that patients would even travel the long dusty journey by rail or road from Freetown to receive treatment and for operations. They also welcomed the ban on bribery!

It was a hard life for us all. In spite of being satisfied with Mark and Mary, Michael joined us in '61! In 1964 The Maua Hospital in Kenya was suddenly without a doctor, and the MMS asked Paul to return to Kenya. Our time in Segwema came to an end. From being a peaceful country, poor Sierra Leone was torn apart by war. The missionaries were called home, though one doctor remained for some time. The hospital was largely destroyed including the Theatre. Since then it has been struggling back to life with mainly indigenous leadership. Freetown as an overcrowded city was the focus of the Ebola epidemic. The Nixon, being in a rural area was less affected. The hospital is now free of Ebola and the nursing school back to normal. However, All WE CAN has just gone into partnership with the Methodist Church in Sierra Leone to establish a new EBOLA SURVIVOR SUPPORT CENTRE based at Nixon Memorial - So a new role and a new chapter beginning in the life of the Hospital. There are many Friends of Nixon who continue to support with gifts and prayers – so a big 'thankyou' to all who contribute to ALL WE CAN. The work goes on.

One more step along the way . . . Developments at Swaffham

This was one of the hymns we sang at the Covenant Service led by Rev. Eleanor in January and we certainly have sense of, 'and it's from the old travel to the new', as continue we to progress our plans for Swaffham.



With the funding in place, the contract has gone out to tender and we are hopeful of beginning the regeneration work soon after Easter. In the meantime, we have needed a temporary home and it looks as if we have found this in the form of a vacated shop, which is located on the other side of the road from the church, a short walk via the pedestrian crossing.

Being a shop, and not wanting to go through the arduous process of change of usage, we have come up with the idea of becoming a TraidCraft outlet. This means that we will have a clear retail function, certainly a new purpose and at the same time plenty of space to hold regular services and other church meetings.

With the full go ahead from Church Council, there is a new energy to find meaning that goes way beyond modernised and refurbished premises. Selling TraidCraft goods in itself is an activity which helps Christians from other countries but there can be so much more to gain from the enterprise.

We are very excited about having a shop window on the Methodist Church in a prominent location on London Street in Swaffham. We hope it will become a place where local people can drop-in to browse, to chat, to find friendship and see faith in action.

Our experience of this initiative will also help us to decide on new directions for when we find ourselves back in the church building. To help us think about the future, we have been working with Yasmin Finch, District Mission Enabler, exploring our vision, looking at our strengths and weaknesses and daring to dream!

As we press on with the many details that need to be addressed to bring the building works to fruition, it is good to keep in mind the words of Psalm 127: Unless the Lord builds the house, the builders labour in vain. Unless the Lord watches over the city, the guards stand watch in vain.

LITCHAM QUARTERLY QUERYISTS

From Stephen Lynn: This is a new ecumenical group which will be meeting once a quarterly basis to examine all sorts of aspects both of our faith and other faiths. We held our first meeting in November when we looked at the similarities and differences between the three Abrahamic faiths, and it was so successful that we are going to carry it through into 2018.

Our next meeting will be on March 22nd, at 7pm. at Litcham chapel and we are delighted that our guest speaker will be the Chaplain to the Bishop of Norwich, the Rev Susanna Gunner. Her topic will be 'Stoneyheartedness and Surrender'. (No, I didn't know it was a real word either!). The meeting will be around an hour, and there will be an opportunity for refreshment and conversation afterwards.

Everyone is very welcome, so do join us for a stimulating evening of mutual learning in an informal setting.

I have said many times before that I do not hold a stock between Circuit Meetings, particularly with the large gap between the Autumn and Spring meetings, due to the problem with product use by dates.

It is therefore incumbent on churches to ensure that they hold an adequate supply to meet their needs. I am quite happy to continue ordering the wine on a bulk basis to keep the cost down, but need your cooperation in placing your orders no later than 2 weeks prior to the Circuit Meeting.

This time I am going to bring the date ahead slightly, and ask that you place your orders by **MARCH 1st**.

If you are desperate in the meantime, there is nothing to stop you ordering direct from Broadland Wines from their website. The cost will be higher as you will have to pay carriage, and you will lose the advantage of

It was quite difficult to work in there for a week or two as the piles of boxes grew higher and wider.

We sent a total of 242, twice as many as before from a variety of sources: Gt Ellingham Chapel, 2 local schools, our own church and local community, and from Swaffham Parish church and convent school.

A very good effort by everyone concerned.
