MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

It has been a delight getting to know the people of Central Norfolk Circuit since September. Thank you for your generous welcome and support. I am sorry that I was 'out of action' for a while in the Autumn. I returned to work in December so could share the joys of Christmas through different activities in the southern section of the circuit. This is where my ministry is based, I'm looking forward to thoughts and ideas becoming action!

I have been asked to introduce myself so here goes: I come from Sussex, part of a musical family which led me to performing on the one hand, and teaching piano and violin, for more than 20 years, on the other hand. Following the call to diaconal ministry in my mid-forties, I trained in



Birmingham at The Queen's Foundation – it seemed a long way from the south but I loved being there – and was then sent to Fleet in Hampshire for my first appointment. Fleet Methodist Church was a large one and I was very involved with all the pastoral work which had its challenges but was also a huge privilege.

When Jacqui and I moved to Wymondham in 2010, I was in the middle of Cancer treatment so was not able to be placed in a circuit appointment. When I recovered, I was blessed by being given the opportunity to work at the University of East Anglia as the Free Church Chaplain. A little later, a further blessing came as I was also appointed Chaplain to Cromwell House, the MHA care home in Norwich. These two very different roles meant that I was serving a wide range of ages, in very different places. I appreciated the variety, the responsibility and the interactions with so many people. Building relationships happened naturally through sharing both the good, and not so good, times in people's lives.

I am looking forward to the future with anticipation as I seek to discern which roles and activities (particularly in Dereham, Swaffham and Watton) I need to invest my time in. That process of discernment involves others and will take time. A Deacon's role often takes place at the fringes of church life, involving engagement with local people and local communities, there are lots of opportunities for this in the places mentioned in my profile. I am happy to talk about being a Deacon, and about my new role, so please do ask me how I am getting on if you see me!

LOCAL PREACHER'S ACCREDITATION SERVICE FOR SAM PARFITT

Wednesday 22nd January was a special evening for the Circuit as Holt Methodist Church hosted a celebration service for Sam Parfitt in her becoming an accredited Local Preacher. Readings were taken from Isaiah 6 v 1-8, 2 Timothy 3 v 14 - 4 v 5 and Luke 10 v 1-9,17. John Hull gave the sermon, focusing on the reading from Luke's gospel, in particular that Jesus chose another 72 people to 'work amongst the people', just as Sam and other Local Preachers are called to do so in their ministry today.

Sam shared her testimony in a very light hearted and inspiring style. Having never heard her preach before, it highlighted her ability to 'capture her audience' as well as her passion for sharing her faith, despite Sam's initial reservations when she was first called to consider being a Local Preacher. Sam focused on her choice of Holt Methodist Church for this accreditation service: the fact that it was where she came to worship, where she was married and where their daughter was christened. She described the significance of the creaky door at Holt, leading into the



church, the numerous times that she and other people have walked through that door and other doors within this Circuit. Sharing this testimony from memory, I do not wish to misquote Sam but what I took away from it was that we may walk through different doors in different churches and what is on the other side might vary. In addition, we need to help others to walk through those doors as well and to welcome them in.

There were between 45 and 50 people at the service, including some of Sam's family and friends and it was good to see Rev Andrew King there. The service was taken by Rev Jacqui Horton, with Sam committing herself to the 'duties' of being an accredited Local Preacher as well as the other Local Preachers being recognised for the service they already offer as well as being supported by the congregation. Sam was presented with a Bible of her choice - the Wesley Study Bible and a letter of 'welcome and congratulations' to Sam from the President and Vice-President of the Conference was read out. Very appropriately, it welcomed her into 'the Wesley family' (or words to that effect!).

Light refreshments followed after the service. Thanks go in particular to Jen Woodfin for playing the piano, to Josey Bunting for her wonderful refreshments, to other members of Holt Methodist Church and Rev Cliff Shanganya for organising the occasion.

EDNA GREVES



TELLING OUR STORY

The Saturday before Remembrance Sunday 2019 I went to Haverhill Methodist Church in Suffolk for a day organised for our District and Beds. Essex and Herts. District (BEH) by Cliff College. The Story project https://thestoryproject.org.uk/ builds on the theme that everyone has a story to tell.

Our President and Vice President of Conference Barbara Glasson have written "So What's The Story?": A resource book for Christian reflection and practice (Paperback). This has been their theme for the year.

Using stories is a wonderful and effective way of sharing our faith. We are perhaps familiar with the old-style testimony story and sometimes these can be effective but what this day set out to do was encourage us to share something that God had done for us recently. To help us we engaged in various activities, one was to pick up a children's book from the display and read it to someone we didn't know. We were to make it as interesting as possible. I loved this having worked in schools and also read numerous books to my daughter. My new friend and I became engrossed in the tale. Don't ask me which book, I can't honestly remember. A second task was to share a recent experience where God had spoken through us and a young woman from BEH District shared a touching story of a simple holding cross she had given to a dear friend who was dying, and how the cross came back to her. Other workshops were held involving drawing, colouring, mapping our story, or just talking to someone.

As part of the day we were encouraged to go into a recording booth and record 5 minutes where God had spoken to us or used us recently. I rushed to do my talk just to get it over with, it was daunting to stand and talk and see yourself in the monitor. My story lasted less than 3 minutes. Later I was informed that there were technical problems and my recording had not come out. I repeated it and was given the reference number so I could download it at home. Unfortunately, I couldn't access it and Cliff College told me that recording had not worked either! I shared that story at the Local Preachers meeting and some of it is in the District Lent Study. Here is another story of God working in my life:

My Father died in the early hours of Sunday. January 28th 2018. He had been diagnosed with Bowel Cancer at Christmas 2017 and was deteriorating fast. I sat with him all day on the 26th holding his hand, chatting, and we were both able to say how much we loved each other. He wanted to go, life was too difficult with painful medication and discomfort. I left at teatime and decided I needed to have Saturday doing ordinary things. Why?

It got to 10.30pm on the 27th and I really didn't want to go to bed. The phone rang it was the onduty senior at the care home. Dad had fallen out of bed, had coughed up some nasty stuff and she thought she ought to call a doctor and ambulance. I said I would join her and made the 5 minute journey. Dad immediately wanted me to go, even in distress he wanted to protect 'his little girl'. In the end he accepted that I was staying and a chair was set up for me at the foot of the bed. He didn't want me crowding him and in fact at one point told me to 'sit down'. I will spare you all the details but I was helped through the night by a calm that set in, assisting Dad as necessary, supporting him when he refused to go to hospital. Persuading the doctor, to listen to Dad's

wishes, the paramedics view, and the staff, all who were supporting him in staying. As the doctor left he touched my arm and said you 'know what is going to happen'. I felt at peace and a strange comfort. Dad died later with me watching him and nodding giving him, if you like, permission to go. It was quick. Just him and me. I said a prayer over him and went to find staff.

My relief was that Dad had been spared further intervention. God was with us both that night. Just as he was with me 8 years previously on July 22nd 2011 as I sat outside Norwich prison before travelling home. I didn't want to go home and I didn't know why. I delayed going for about 10 minutes. When I reached Guist I was diverted through Stibbard because of an accident. My husband died in that crash, and later I was told by the police, that had I left earlier, I would have witnessed it. God doesn't always speak to us in words, but he guides us and is with us.

We all have stories to tell. I am sure if you think about it there are times when God has spoken, or as in my case prepared you to face what is to come. These stories can help us to show to others what God has done in our lives. Sometimes it's something very simple rather than dramatic. Instead of a testimony from our conversion to now, perhaps occasions where His presence has enabled and strengthened us, though of course sensitivity in which story we use where, is needed.

LIVINGLENT


Ever since our Hymnathon in 2016, when, with the help of musicians from around the Circuit, we sang every one of the 748 hymns in Singing the Faith, and raised £3,000 for our Pinnacle Appeal, Swaffham has continued to mark the season of Lent with a special series. The purpose of this has been to prepare, reflect, learn and in a practical way, to have the doors of the church open every weekday.



Now that we are able to benefit from the regenerated sanctuary, the doors are already regularly open: two days a week for The Meeting Place drop-in, another day a week for the Power of Prayer group and often a fourth day for courses such as Talking Jesus which we held in January and February, this year.

The 2020 Lent series has had to dovetail in with these other happenings and so a programme has been put together with the intention of providing a variety of opportunities that will appeal to different interests.

Starting on Friday 28th February, there are 6 sessions of the Bible Study on Acts written by Catherine Hutton, Superintendent of the Norwich Circuit, called, 'A Community of Witness'. Taking place at 10.15am for 45 minutes, this connects well to the Talking Jesus series and to the President and Vice-President of Conference's theme of, 'So, What's the Story', which is also the title of their jointly written book which we were encouraged to read by Rev. Jacqui in the run-up to Christmas 2019.



Each Monday, the week begins with a Meditation from 9.30 to 10.00am. It will be a time of quiet reflection before the busyness of the week makes its usual demands! Here is one of the prayers we will be using —







HOLT METHODIST CHURCH Sunday, 31st May From 12.00 noon



The Replanting Rural Team has had a busy winter, and lots has happened since the last edition of The Link. In early winter the Management Committee for the project took the difficult but necessary decision to close Blakeney's Café TMC. So much wonderful ministry has been done there over the last eight years but gradually the Café had become harder to resource in terms of finances, staff and volunteers and it was felt by all of us that it had served well but the time had come to celebrate its success and open ourselves to discerning God's next move for us in Blakeney. This is a time of listening for us, both to God and to the Community we serve, and we pray that this year will give us 2020 vision!

However, we have not been idle and trialled a very successful Sunday Lunch on the 15th December. 60 people came and enjoyed a full roast dinner and a pudding for which there was no charge, but donations were welcomed. It was wonderful to see the chapel full to the brim! We are planning another one in March and would be very pleased to hear from anyone who would like to help, whether you're a skilled spud peeler or a warm welcome, we'd love to hear from you!

We also celebrated the 30th anniversary of Carols in the Courtyard and had a lovely, albeit windy time of fellowship and song followed by warm mince pies and hot alcohol-free mulled wine.

Café Church continues to thrive, and we celebrated our first ever Café Communion in the New Year as part of our Covenant Service led by Rev. Cliff.



In Walsingham we enjoyed joining the community for the switching on of the lights and the blessing of the nativity scene. The occasion had extra special meaning for us as Methodists as it took place at the water pump where John Wesley preached in 1781. In addition, we met a Shetland pony whose name was Wesley!!! After a rousing rendition of Hark the Herald Angels Sing, we headed back to the Chapel and enjoyed refreshments.

The thing that has surprised me the most about working in Walsingham is the number of people who just pop in, usually for a look around and invariably they are interested in the history of

the building and of Methodism. It has been my privilege to watch as these conversations turn into stories of faith, having heard testimonies from people of all faiths to people of none, weaving a rich tapestry as our story continues.

The incredible work started by Tommy and Sylvia Seaman continues as we look forward to welcoming the Pilgrimages that come annually to Walsingham. We also continue our work with schools, educating young people about Methodist Heritage and who we are today. In the region of one thousand children come through the doors every year and I have been humbled and surprised by the number and depth of questions they ask, my favourite question from last year was from a 15-year-old boy who asked about Creation Theory!

Our monthly Sunday gatherings continue to flourish and every time we meet God has blessed us. At our January meeting twelve of us gathered, including a Methodist family from Malaysia and Hong Kong. It was wonderful to have a time of International fellowship and to learn about the Methodist Church there, which is on the 22nd floor of the building!



The Rural Re-planting project in the north of the Circuit continues, mainly through the work of the Rural Re-planter, Sam Parfitt. However, the Management Committee made a very significant decision in the Autumn, which was to bring (what had previously been the main component of the project) Café TMC to a close. The reasons for this included the fact that the original aims were no longer being met, the fact that Sam had a near impossible job (running a café as well as doing outreach and community work), and the fact that the café was continuing to look financially unsustainable.

We are inviting everyone who has had anything to do with Café TMC to a final celebration of the 8 years of its existence on **Sunday March 8th at 3 pm** in the Blakeney building. There will, of course, be 'pop up' café refreshments as well as a warm welcome.

The closure of this part of the project (which has always been experimental) does not mean that the Café experiment has failed in some way. As an experiment – that has had some major benefits during its existence – it has been successful. As well as the missional and relational benefits, much has been learned, and much has been established which is being taken into the wider continuing project.

However, the Rural Re-planter has now been freed up to pursue community engagement and church re-planting in both villages in a purposeful and positive way, with a lot more time to do so. Services and events continue in the Methodist Churches in both Blakeney and Walsingham – do look out for activities that welcome wider circuit support.

A more detailed report of the new phase of the project will appear in the next issue of the Link. In the meantime, please ask Sam about what she is now doing when you see her. We look to the future with hope and expectation!

MARRIAGE AND RELATIONSHIPS

I have been asked to put together a letter regarding the report of The Marriage and Relationships Task Group called "God In Love Unites Us" for study and prayerful discussion. You can find the full report on the Methodist Church of GB website and I have a copy if you wish to see it. This report was discussed extensively at the 2019 Methodist Conference and was passed by a large majority to send it back to Circuits and Districts for a final consultation before being either ratified or lost at the 2020 conference. This was discussed briefly at our last Circuit Meeting and at some of our Church Councils and there will be a Circuit Consultation day in the New Year. Feedback from the Circuit Day will be sent to the District. No votes are being taken at church or circuit level but at our District Spring Synod which will go up to Connexion as the overall view of the East Anglia District.

Briefly they are offering an addition to the present marriage vows which state that Marriage is between a man and a woman to include the option of Marriage is between two people. This will mean that the Methodist Church will offer marriage and blessings to those in a same sex relationship. The United Reformed Church passed this a few years ago and the other denominations are having their own discussions.

What this means is that if it is passed at Conference 2020 then Church Councils in October 2020 with a marriage licence will decide by vote if they are prepared to hold such services and ministers will decide if they are able to preside at the service. If either decide they cannot then they will be required to direct the couple to a church and minister who will. In a Circuit there might be just a few churches and ministers who will preside.

If the motion is not passed then it will not, in my opinion, go away for ever but will be continually prayed about and discussed until another time. If it is passed then it will come into effect immediately.



Over £6,000 has now been raised for the 'Bees, Beds and Blessings' fund which our District MWiB ladies have been supporting. This money goes directly to help the church in Jamaica with projects aimed at making it more financially independent and supports a longer term plan to create some residential accommodation for staff and pupils at the Methodist school premises. The projects reflect MWiB's enduring interest in and commitment to the wellbeing of the church overseas.

On a wider Connexional scale, the theme of the Easter Offering dedication service is 'Into all the world'. The service will be held at Dereham Trinity on 24th May at 3.00 p.m. It will be followed by our customary 'Bring and Share' tea and it is an opportunity to celebrate our call to live generously and to spend a time of fellowship together. The Easter Offering is only administered by MWiB on behalf of the wider church. All of the money raised through the Lent envelope collection goes to the World Mission Fund of the Methodist Church and is then directed on to support the work of the 65 Partner Churches around the world. Please give as generously as you are able.

In April we will welcome Revd Dr Lord Leslie Griffiths to speak at our District Day. This event is being held at the St Ives church on Thursday April 23rd from 10 to 3.30 and we expect to have a lively day with such an able communicator. - "Fancy asking a Welshman to speak on St. George's day!" [L.G.] - If anyone is interested in joining us for the day please let me know and we will see what transport can be arranged.



NEWS FROM WIMPCF


LITCHAM

Had they, for example, already begun to change the congregation's attitude to the biblical stories of Creation? If so, what would preachers have said to them? And had you or I been there, how would we have responded?


